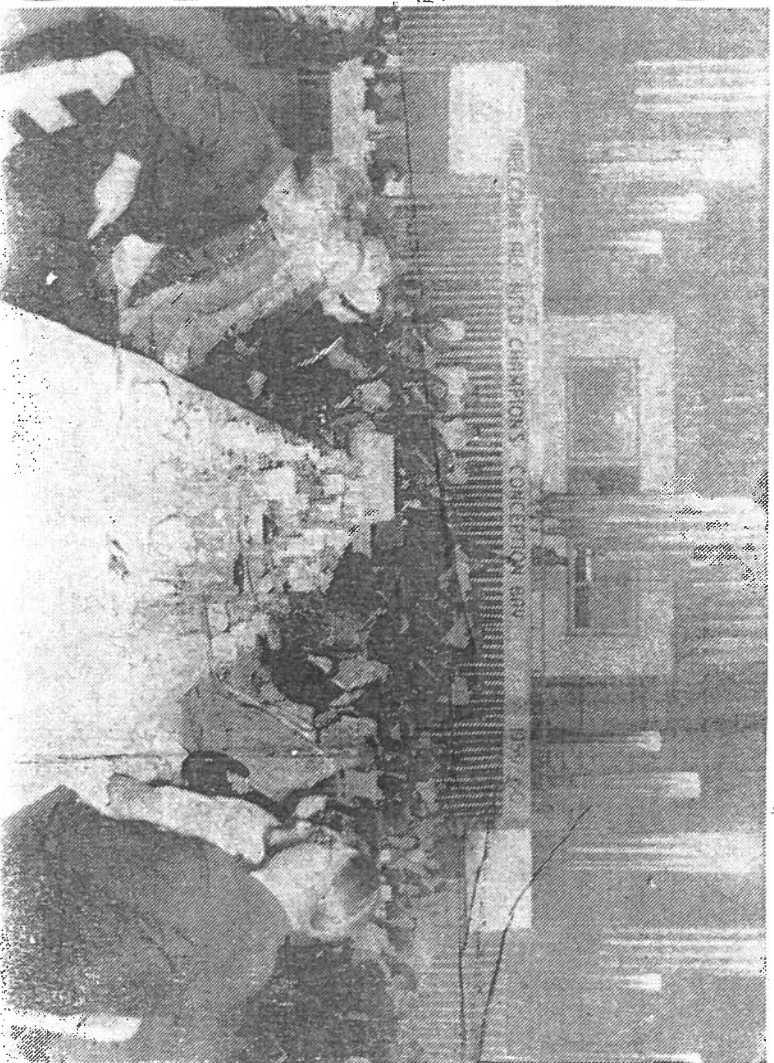
Alex Moores, mayor of Harbour Grace, was chairman for the affair.

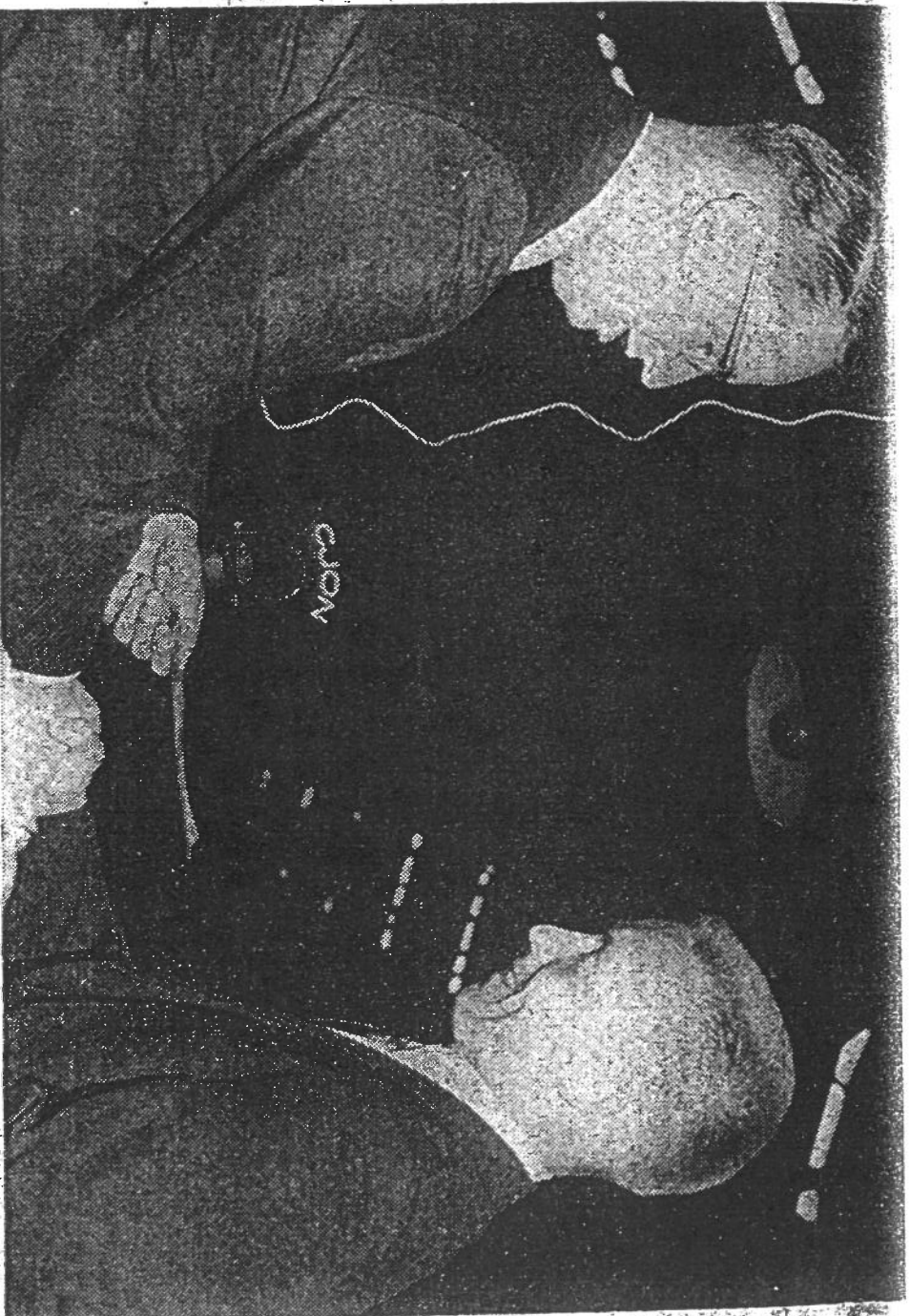

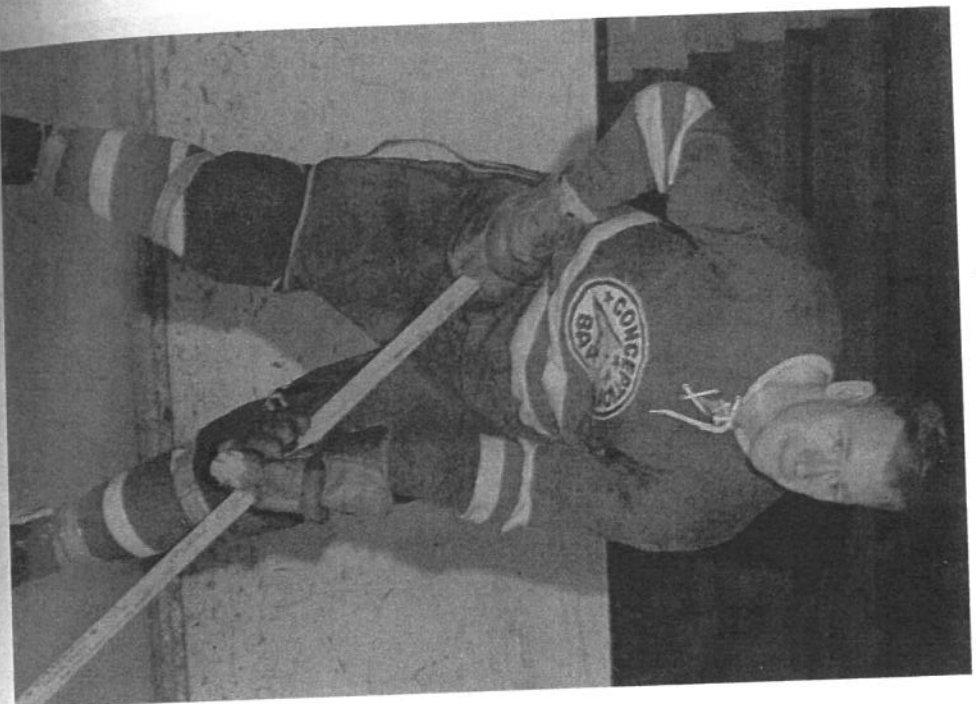
